The proposal was to declare 21<sup>st</sup> of March every year as the **Surveyors' Day** in parallel with the **Global Surveyors' Day** was made by the Minister of Lands, which was approved by the Cabinet of Sri Lanka in 2018. The aim of the Global Surveyors'
